


MAJOR CRUISE SHIP ACCIDENTS

268 total overboard accidents have been reported since 1995; average of 12.8 per year **Royal Caribbean** 39 overboard accidents



Average number of overboard accidents in the past 10 years (2005-2014) – 19.3 per year



Norwegian Cruise Line 20 overboard accidents



26 persons went overboard in 2015 alone (January – November)

The highest number of overboard accidents occurred in 2015

CRUISE SHIP CRIME

As per data collected by the FBI, the following is a summary of cruise ship crime rates, including serious crimes like cruise ship rape and sexual assault,

suspicious death, and theft:



50 New cases of crime on the high seas are opened and investigated by the FBI on average per year; the majority occur aboard cruise ships

46% Percent of cruise crime cases from 2002-2007 involved crew members as suspects

74 Total rapes were reported from 2012-2014 by four major cruise lines

29 cases involving assault with serious bodily injury were reported from 2012-2014 by four major cruise lines

BOATING ACCIDENTS

The following data was provided by the U.S. Coast Guard in the organization's 2014 Recreational Boating Statistics report:



4,064 recreational boating accidents were reported by the Coast Guard in 2014





2,678 injuries and **610** deaths resulted from recreational boating accidents in 2014

67 boating accidents in 2014 were reported by the media, but were not reported to the Coast Guard





In 2014, the overall boating accident rate increased **0.05%**, injuries increased by **2.2%**, and deaths increased **8.9%**, when compared to data from 2013



937 boating accidents (majority) were the result of vessel collisions in 2014





Alcohol was the leading factor behind boat-related deaths in 2014, accounting for **21**% of fatalities

Since 2010, an average of **134.6** people died per year in boating accidents resulting from alcohol use





Recreational boating accidents accounted for approximately \$39 million in damages in 2014

The 2014 boating accident fatality rate was **5.2** deaths per 100,000 registered recreational vessels – a **10.6**% increase from the previous year's statistics





The majority of boating accidents occurred between the hours of 12:30 PM and 6:30 PM

July is the month with the highest boating accident rate





77% of boating accidents deaths involved operators that had no prior instruction or education

78% of boating accident deaths were caused by drowning; 84% of drowning victims were not wearing life jackets



The rate of boating accident fatalities was significantly higher when victims were not wearing life jackets
